

Important Information About Absentee And Mail-In Voting And Voting At Polls

If you are sent a mail-in or regular civilian absentee ballot and the county receives your voted ballot by the deadline (8:00 p.m. on election day), you may not vote at your polling place. Your vote is considered final at that point. However, if you mailed your ballot too late, or you aren't sure whether the county received your voted ballot in time, you may be able to vote a provisional ballot at your polling place. If you were sent a mail-in or regular civilian absentee ballot, but your polling place has no record of having received it, you may vote by provisional ballot. However, if the county does receive your voted mail-in or regular civilian absentee ballot in time, that ballot, not your provisional ballot, will be counted. **Remember, you may always return your mail-in or regular civilian absentee ballot at the county board of election's office by 8:00 p.m. on election day.**
